






- Understand the spatiality of cemeteries




• 5 Shanghai cemeteries as case studies :


- Tianchang Cemetery -上海天长公墓
- Zhuanqiao Sleeping Garden -上海市颛桥寝园
- Binhai Ancient Garden -上海滨海古园
- Jielong Ancient Garden 界龙古园
- Fushouyuan Harbour Cemetery 界龙古园
 - Selected according to their creation date, their size and their distance from the center of Shanghai to constitute a representative panel
- Analysis of laws and regulations about funerary places and practices
 - Official governmental documents published by the municipality
 - Interview with **Wu FangFang**, Urban planner of the *Shanghai Urban Planning and Design Institute*, in charge of the Shanghai funerary spaces planning for Shanghai 2035, in May 2018.
- Online survey, A cemetery for today and tomorrow? (现状与未来的墓葬空间)
 - Conducted online, 45 collected answers, from October 2018 to May 2019

• Supplemented by **literature**:

- Literature references in **sociology**, **anthropology** or **philosophy** fields, but lack in our disciplinary field and all the more so in burials in China today
- Both European and Chinese references as much as possible, to mirror with international cases thanks to scientific articles analysis














Rationalization in the Shanghainese grave pattern *Personal production*






Funerary spaces of tomorrow: The dematerialization of the cemetery through ecological burial






Progressive acceptance of sea burial since 2003






Transformation of the Shanghainese deathscape in favor of ecological burials *Personal photographs*




